

A boxing and wrestling show in Hangar "B" at 1600 featured ex-pro and amateur stars.

From 1600 to 1730 a gigantic picnic dinner was served on the Athletic Field, with chicken, sandwiches, salads, ice cream, and all the trimmin's.


USO entertainers gave the troops an hour of gals, music, and laughs in the Aero Club at 1700. British stage, radio, and screen luminaries performed at 1900.

Officers dances were held at Mess #1 and Mess #2, with music by the Flying Eagles and the Hepcats. Their Cinderella day ended at 2400.


This day hasn't been recorded for history like our memorable missions, but it is a date those who were there wont forget. For a little while the war went away.

Schedule Set For Memorial Dedication





91st Picture Aided Prisoners

Under the "Eagle's" Wing!



A painting of an aircraft in flight, autographed by British and American Service men, which has been the subject of a competition at Ethel of the Eagle, O.E. Walker. one of the oldest hostelries in Cambridge-the Eagle, in Bene't Street. The proceeds are in aid of the Prisoners of War Fund. Service men have also expressed their appreciation of the welcome extended to them when they are "called to the bar" by covering the ceiling with lipstick or lighter-flame records of their units.

This picture of the 91st plane Chief Sly was painted by an RAF pilot-artist in 1943. The painting was hung in the Eagle Pub and raffled off to aid the Prisoners of War fund. For 10 shillings you got to autograph the picture and a chance at winning. It was won by S/Sgt. Myron C. Srsen, who was ball turret gunner on Chief Sly.

Chief Sly was the lead ship on the historic Hamm mission.

Dig Deep - Keep Contributions Flying!
