C. Carlton Brechler Dies

C. Carlton Brechler, who was Group public relations officer for the 91st from the first days, died suddenly and unexpectedly December 31, 1977, on the last day of his vacation at his home on St. Croix, U.S. Virgin Islands.

At the time of his death Carlton was Manager, Western Region, Public Relations Staff, General Motors Corp., based in Los Angeles.

He joined the AAF in June, 1942, and went to England with the 91st Sept. 26, 1942. He returned to the U.S. in November, 1945, one of the first over and last to return.

After his service with the 91st he was assigned to 8th Air Force Headquarters.

Major Brechler was the author of "Wray's Ragged Irregulars," a book of the first year of operations by the 91st.

He was one of the small first group to return to Bassingbourn when the Maddingley altar bowl and the Royston Park fountain were dedicated.

He suffered very critical injuries, and is only now slowly recovering. Joe is a familiar figure at National Reunions and had been looking forward to Memphis, but their attendance this year is now doubtful.

Swedish Broadcasting Corp. producer-director Torbjorn Olausson, whose hobby is researching American crews who landed in Sweden in WW II spent several weeks in April visiting the U.S/ While he was here he visited Western Division secretary-treasurer George Parks before leaving the San Francisco area for Washington and a meeting with Lt. Gen Ira C. Eaker. Torbjorn has written several stories for the Ragged Irregular on 91st planes and crews that landed in Sweden.

One day Wagner returned to the barracks early, much before lunch and the rest of the gang, and proceded to nail a pair of Gaybruk's shoes to the floor and then depart. When lunchtime came, Wagner didn't show up for the usual blackjack game. Now, one of the barrack routines was that beds had to be made and the room floor dry mopped before reporting back to work after lunch. When the mopping began, Gaybruk found his shoes nailed to the floor. Needless to say, he knew who did the nailing.

In a rage, Gaybruk took off to the shop and returned with hammer and nails and proceded to nail down a pair of Wagner's work shoes to the floor.

Everyone laughed, little realizing that the real joke was to come later. That evening after work and dinner when all were just "sacking it out" before going to town, Wagner got up and said to Gaybruk, "Say, what are my shoes doing under your bed?" And with this he got up and removed his shoes from under Gaybruk's bed. Some of the support units who did such outstanding work for the 91st sometimes get overlooked in our stories of Bassingbourn days. Those airplane drivers and passengers whose earliest views of many bomb targets were those wonder-chutes aboard, Judy and another ful sky markers pointing a white finger of smoke to the heart of the target will appreaciate this note from Wayne A. Cupper, of Lake Oswego, Oregon, ex-C.O. of the 863rd Chemical Co. (AOH) Air Operations Heavy Bombardment.

Wayne says: "We arrived at Glasgow on August 17, 1942, and then went to Alconbury. It was a marktime mish-mash until October 5 when we split the company almost in half to send 59 enlisted men and 2 officers to service the 303rd B.G. at Molesworth.

"Then, very fortunately, the other part went to Station 121 at Bassingbourn on November 2. This was the H.Q. company and 1st platoon. Our first contact with the 91st was Major Nathan Roberts, a real prince.

"From there at Station 121 we progressed to:

- 1. Our own bomb dump--Incendiaries separated from H.E., a good idea.
- 2. Loading crews formed, including a CWS man, a good idea should we get into chemical warfare later.

"In our sojourn we serviced the 91st, the 303rd, and the 93rd. The 91st was tops by far.

"One of our functions was to prepare the Sky Markers, an 8th Air Force inovation to promote saturation pattern bombing. We manufactured the Sky Markers from 100 1b. light case incendiaries. We blew out the jellied gasoline, converted and filled with FS smoke. We usually loaded 6-- 2 lead, 2 spare lead, and 2 standby lead.

"We are proud of our contribution to the 91st."

Raymond W. Judy of 3066 Behme Road, Custer, Wa. 98240, would like to contact 91st-ers who knew his brother James Donald Judy, who was a pilot in the 322nd sqdn. in

1943. Judy's first ship was "My Prayer," which was very severely damaged on the Schweinfurt raid of August 17, 1943. Seven of the crew bailed out, but with the engineer seriously wounded and only two good crew member brought the crippled ship back to Bassingbourn. Judy was shot down October 9, 1943, and wound up in Stalag Luft III. He came back to the Air Force in 1947 and was killed in 1955 flying a B-25 out of Mitchell AFB, N.Y. If you knew him please write to Raymond Judy.
