Memphis again proved a tremendous magnet for 91st-ers, with more than 300 on hand for the National Reunion July 19-21. Hosts Joe and Mary Gagliano and Frank Donofrio and Madeline Henders, and Eastern Division committee members Paul Chryst, Joe Camelleri, Bob Gerstemeier, and Joe Giambrone had put together a terrific packet of entertainment and nostalgia that convinced everyone that 91st get-togethers get better every time! You who stayed at home really missed one!

Group activities began with a tour down the Mississippi River aboard the Memphis Showboat, with entertainment, dinner, and dancing enjoyed in addition to the river

views. The entire boat was reserved for the 91st.


A tour of Memphis which took in the area of the Martin Luther King slaying, and a visit to Graceland, Elvis Presley's home, wound up with a visit to the Memphis Belle. The old aircraft, awaiting refurbishing and the construction of a museum to house it, was swamped by members clambering through it to view again remembered B-17 duty posts of 35 years ago.

The group on Thursday toured the Schlitz Brewery and had dinner at the Brewery's

Riverboat dining area.

One of the most impressive things to many members was the fantastic police escort that led the 91st buses on their tours. Host Joe Gagliano, formerly chief of detectives and assistant police chief in Memphis, now Chief of Police in the Memphis suburb of Germantown, had arranged a motorcycle escort that sometimes numbered as many as 10 vehicles. With lights flashing and sirens screaming they led the buses past thousands of motorists and spectators who could not imagine who the VIPs were with such an escort.

Host Frank Donofrio arranged and conducted a special visit for 91st wives to St. Jude's Childrens Hospital, world famous for its work and research in children's dis-

eases normally considered incurable.

The business meeting of Friday, July 21, was presided over by Col. Tom Gunn, vice president, in the absence of Gen S.T. Wray, who was undergoing treatment at the Eglin Field hospital and was unable to attend. There were 115 voting members present (2 national officers, 60 Eastern Division members and 53 Western Division members.) This constituted a quorum.

Members gave the Eastern Division Reunion Committee members and the local hosts a standing ovation to express their gratitude for the tremendous efforts in producing a

super reunion.

The Secretary and the Treasurer from each division reported on the status of their respective divisions, with the East reporting a balance of \$972.63 and the West reporting a balance of \$2,576.29. These are monies representing operating funds for

day-to-day operation and do not include memorial donations.

Included in new business was a discussion of future reunion locations and dates. The members voted that future reunions be hld during the months of July-October, with the officers selecting the sites as in the past. The members also voted that the Association should have a directory with a loose-leaf notebook format to include a copy of the By-Laws. This would facilitate annual updating at a nominal cost of about \$30. The last item under new business was a discussion of a proposed revision of the By-Laws, primary features of which were to establish a unified, national association in lieu of a divided (East-West) organization and to codify the positions of 1st Vice President and 2nd Vice President established by vote at the 1976 National Reunion. The members decided properly that a revision of such magnitude and importance should be submitted by mail to all voting members, thereby giving all an opportunity to examine, comment and vote on the proposal.

Election of officers was conducted under the terms of the 1968-69 By-Laws. Prior to the election the members unanimously acclaimed a resolution that Stanley T. Wray, M/Gen USAF (Ret) be honored as President Emeritus of this Association. The officers elected were: Thomas H. Gunn, President; Paul C. Burnett, Editor-Historian; Eastern Division Chairman, Co-chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer, respectively, W.W. Hill, Jack Feairheller, and John C. Flinn, Jr.; Western Division Chairman, Co-chairman, and Secretary-Treasurer respectively, John R. McCombs, Glenn V. Boyce and George W. Parks.

Wrapping up the fabulous four days was the reunion banquet and dance at the Rivermont Friday night. The reunion committee had a wonderfully decorated ballroom, delicious food, and a smooth band providing WW II tunes, to climax the affair.

Receiving the mug for having travelled the greatest distance to attend were the Richard McCoys of Lynden, Washington, though there was close competition from several

other Washington couples.

Shoo Shoo Baby Gets Nose Job

Restoration of Shoo Shoo Baby is proceding steadily at Dover, Del., with the first major structural work of attaching a new nose section to the main fuselage completed. Members of the 512th Military Airlift Wing (Associate) (Air Force Reserve) are carrying out the two-year task of bring the plane back to full flying status as a community service project.

The sheet metal work was performed by TSgt Lucien Lefebvre, a Reservist, during his off duty times while on his two weeks annual tour. As a civilian Lefebvre is a metal worker with Norfolk Naval Air Rework Facility in Virginia. The new nose was provided

by the Air Force Museum.

Already the restoration group is planning for the replacement of the nose art that adorned Shoo Shoo Baby, and the 91st's famous nose art specialist Tony Starcer has

volunteered for the job.

In a strange coincidence the man who took the only known photograph of Shoo Shoo Baby as she limped into Malmo, Sweden, recently discovered the plane again at Dover. In 1944 Lt. Chris Tack was executive officer for the internees in Sweden. As part of his job he would go to fighters and bombers who diverted to Sweden, remove the secret black boxes and other classified documents, and take a photo of the plane.

After the war Tack continued his career with the Air Force, and retired as a C-141 flight examiner at Dover AFB in 1970. In September Lt. Col. Tack ran across the plane in a hangar at Dover. He still has the original picture taken over 34 years

ago.







If you have not paid your dues for 1978 you will NOT receive the new up-dated membership directory of both divisions.

Hard-working Jack Feairheller, a Life Member who has made every 91st reunion, was elected co-chairman of the Eastern Division at the Memphis reunion. Jack had undergone open heart surgery shortly before the reunion, and upon his return home his doctor insisted that he slow down and give up some of his many activities. So Jack has been forced to resign his co-chairmanship. For the present W.W. Hill, chairman, will handle the post alone.

At the Memphis reunion in July it was reported that all bills received had been paid and there was money remaining in the escrow account. As is usually the case in projects of this nature, there are unforeseen expenses. The original estimate of \$3,010 was affected significantly by

the ensuing rate of exchange of the U.S. dollar. The "final" known expenses are \$3,238 stonemasonry, \$1,218 landscaping, and \$344 (D.Crow: U.K. representative handling arrangements) for a total \$4,800. Contributions to date total only \$4,114, a deficit of \$686.

Members pledged \$4,931; that was close! Unfortunately, many who pledged forgot to contribute or couldn't remember the address to which the donation should be sent. The final listing of donors will be printed in the January R/I.

Thanks to the great efforts of Joe Franke the group shots of the squadrons at the National Reunion have something we haven't been able to accomplish since 1968--the identification of members! The commercial photographer hired for the occasion had to cancel at the last moment because of the death of his father, and the picture taking fell in the lap of the editor. Joe, with much experience working with several members of his family who are professional photographers, did the posing and identification, leaving the editor only the easy work of snapping the shot.
