Madingley Memorial Ceremony - 25 May 2009

Our weather forecasters predicted that the weather for the Monday 25th May was going to be heavy rain with thunderstorms, so one made sure that waterproof clothing was in the car. Fortunately, they were wrong, as we had a just a few spots which made for a pleasant change after the last three years.

Upon arriving at the Cemetery I always check to see of the Group's wreath is there, which also gives me the opportunity to obtain the Group's wreath number.

For the majority of the readers of the Ragged Irregular I will just run through the Order of Service that may be the format covered where ever the Memorial Service is celebrated throughout the world. We all stand to greet the Official Party which included Jonna Doolittle-Hoppes the grand daughter of General Doolittle, USAF.

After the arrival of the Official Party the Colours are Posted by a Guard of Honour from RAF Mildenhall. This was followed by British and American National Anthems.

Lt Col David E Stookey, Commander, 100th Communications Squadron as Master of Ceremonies gave the introduction. He was followed by Mr Richard LeBaron, Charges d'affaires ad interim at the American Embassy in London, who gave Welcome remarks. The Invocation was given by the Chaplain of the 100th Air Refuelling Wing, RAF Mildenhall, Major Stuart King.

The Opening Remarks came from Mr Hugh Duberly, Her Majest's Lord-Lieutenant of Cambridgeshire. Then Jonna Doolittle-Hoppes gave the Address. This was followed by Cemetery History. Then that magic moment when all the Veterans are asked to stand and duly receive the applause of the congregation.

This is followed by a Moment of Silence. The American Service men who have been standing out of sight behind the Wall

of the Missing enter carrying wreaths. This is a very impressive sight with well over one hundred wreaths brought in to line up along the length of the Wall of the Missing. Those laying wreaths are then called forward and

take their place in front of the wreath carrier who has their wreath. Upon the order Presenters Please Take Your Flowers they step forward to receive their wreath. The 91st BG(H) MA wreath carrier this year was a very young looking Corporal. Wreath carriers are not confined to Non Commission personnel as Officers are also among the wreath carriers.



The Master of Ceremonies then asked Mr Duberly, Major General Zamzow, representing the Third Air Force and Mr LeBaron to lay their wreaths this is followed by the laying of all the other wreaths. We then stand for a Moment of Silence and a Prayer of Remembrance.

Then came the Fly-By, which this year's was by a KC-135 from RAF Mildehall. Sadly the Boeing B-17 Sally B was

unable to make it. We all turn to face the Flag Pole to witness the firing of Volleys / Taps. Finally the Missing Man Formation by F-15C's from RAF Lakenheath.

May I mention that some airmen and air women from RAF Lakenheath have just returned from Iraq and I did notice bouquets of flowers placed by the Wall of the Missing as tributes to personnel who have paid the supreme sacrifice in that theatre of operations.

It is for me an honour and privilege to be able to represent the 91st BG(H) Memorial

Association at this Service and lay the Group's wreath. Thank you.

More "No Short Story"

[Editor's note: This is a follow up to previous R/I articles "324th's Rhapsody in Red's Substitute Set Record" from November 1994 and "324th's "946's" Short Career No Short Story!" in April 1995. The 324th's B-17 43-38946, believed to have been sabotaged, crashed taking off on its first mission. In all, the Eighth Air Force lost ten bombers on takeoff that day. The crew of "946" were the only to survive.]

On the early morning of December 24, 1944, I was on "Stand Down" and in the process of straightening up our room when I heard engines running up. Looking out the window, I saw what looked like poor flying weather, low ceiling and poor visibility. I decided to head down to the tower to see what was cooking. There I found the mission for the day was on and the squadrons were taxiing out for takeoff. Shortly thereafter, the red flair went up and the roar of engines sounded as the B-17s started down the runway on their take off roll.

Several aircraft had entered the overcast when I thought I heard someone call "Mayday" and could faintly see a B-17 come out of the overcast and continue to descend. I ran down the tower steps, jumped into a jeep with another officer and headed in the direction of where the plane went down.

We finally saw the Fort on its belly in a newly plowed field. We jumped out of the jeep and ran over to see if we could be of any assistance. The first thing I saw was a crew member either sitting or leaning on the wing and the rest of the crew standing around the plane appearing to be in shock from the experience they had just gone through. I remember calling to them to get away from the plane as it might catch fire or explode if any of the gas lines or fuel tanks were ruptured. By this time, the fire truck and ambulance had arrived followed by many other vehicles in tow. Shortly thereafter, I felt it was time to leave and let those with more experience do their job.

On our way back to the jeep, we came across a 500 lb bomb broken in half with the black pellets spilled out in a pile on the ground. This reminded me, as a boy on the Fourth of July, when a fuse came out of a small firecracker, we would break it in half and light the black powder. We knew this was not a place for us, so we continued across the newly plowed field to our jeep.

Not far from the bomb, my eye caught something shining in the mud. My curiosity got the best of me, so I went over and picked up the muddy object. I brushed some mud off and found I had the lenses of a Norden Bomb Sight. These lenses obviously belonged to the 324th's "946" B-17's bomb sight. I took the lenses back

to my room, cleaned them up and brought them home with me.

The lenses have been on display along with some of my other memorabilia a number of times at the Florida Chapter of the 8th AFHS reunions. One of these days I will donate it all to the Mighty Eighth Air Force Museum in Georgia along with the "No Short Story".

It is ironic that the day the Gerald Massie Photos of Mrs. Howe and the goslings appeared on my computer, I also received a letter from David Crow in England. David was a young boy during the time we were putting in time at Bassingbourn. He watched our Flying Fortresses go and come back (sometimes limping) He was very good friend of the Howes Family and still is.

While we were there, Reg and Hettie Howes would hide a few fresh eggs and fresh milk for us. All English produce was supposed to go to the English Government to be distributed where needed. We become friends with them by gift packages of chocolate, cookies, sugar, butter, soap, tobacco, etc. Photographs also are a very good trading material. After the Memphis Belle returned to USA we had good photos of the King and Queen. We made an 11 x 14 inch enlargement of the Queen and gave it to them. I will attach a photo of one of those gift packages. Also Reg brought the Photo Lab a roast chicken near the end of the war, look for that photo also. David Crow had seen my photos of the family and wanted to correct me on some spelling. I had the last name spelled Hewes and should be Howes. Mr. Howes first name was Reg not John etc. I appreciate his information so I can get the captions straight.

In 1978 Jenny and I traveled to England the same time as Paul Chryst had a tour group over there. We were lucky enough to find John (their Son) and he took us to see Hettie, then living near Cambridge. She still had the photo of the Queen on her wall. Jenny took off her neck piece which had the 91st Bomb Group emblem on it and made her an honorary member of the 91st by placing it around her neck. David Crow informed us that both Reg and Hettie have passed away. Richard (John's Son) and wife Pam live in the old farm house and still run a dairy farm. John and his wife Betty built a house

near by. David also told me that Betty recently passed away following a short illness. Audrey (the daughter in the photo) lives in Caxton. David and John get together often.

Joe Harlick's Collection: Ed and Mick

Reported by his son Greg


Tommy was born in Los Angeles in 1918, graduated from South Gate High School in 1936, after which he completed two years at UCLA.

Reported by Richard Hamilton John Butler was first a sergeant in the 30th Infantry before he transferred to the Army Air Corps, 91st Bomb Group, where he served as second lieutenant. On July 20, 1944, while on his sixth mission as bombardier on Destiny's Child on a raid over Leipzig, Germany, the B-17 took fire from enemy aircraft. A witness reported later that the right wing was severed at about Number 4 engine position and Butler's plane was the first to go down. Four crew were killed in action and the remaining crew, including Butler, bailed out as the plane went down. He was captured by the Germans and was held as prisoner in Stalag Luft 3 until April, 1945. He kept a


diary of his experiences in the camp on a roll of toilet paper. A typed transcript is part of the "buseum" a converted school bus that acts as a traveling exhibit of Iowa soldiers in POW camps.

② Joseph Harlick 324th Age 87

Olympia, WA, April 7, 2009

Reported by his wife Jenny Joe was born April 28, 1921.



Joe served with the 91st Bomb Group at Bassingbourn in the photo unit, his primary assignment maintaining strike cameras. He loaded and unloaded film in the B-17's and developed wet prints to see if the targets were hit. He flew 7 combat missions to help solve camera

and film problems plaguing the Eighth Air Force. He photographed many crash scenes, including *Old Faithful*. Joe carried his own personal camera covering events, visiting celebrities, and B-17 nose art.

Returning stateside in 1945, Joseph built the Resort Photo and Art Studio at Hot Springs, Montana which he and Jenny operated for 10 years. He worked in Technical Photography at Boeing Co. Seattle, WA for the next 26 years, retiring in 1983.

Joe was active in the VFW and a member of the Elks for 45 years. Son Jay, who served 2 years in Germany,

died 1988. Joe and Jay are laid to rest at the Tahoma National Veteran's Cemetery side by side in number 91 and 92 in the columbarium wall.

He is survived by wife Jenny of 61 years, son Allan and wife Susan, granddaughter Marjorie, many nieces, nephews and relatives.

[Comments from Ed Gates]

Joe left most of his personal effects in England at the end of the war so that he could bring back to the U.S. photographic negatives and prints providing the base for probably the largest private collection of Eighth Air Force bomb group photography. Joe and Jenny provided free service to people and publications around the world for some 60 years. Much of the collection will be offered to the National Museum of the USAF with the 91st Bomb Group Memorial Association's archives in 2010.
